



## Players to Watch

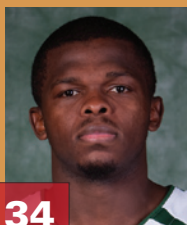


### Damian Saunders

Started all 34 games last season and finished second on the Dukes in minutes per game at 34.6...led the team in rebounding (7.6 rpg), blocked shots (83), and steals (71) and was second in scoring (13.1 ppg)...ranked 22nd nationally in blocked shots per game (2.4)...led the Atlantic 10 in steals per game... his 71 steals eclipsed the school's single-season record of 70 set by guard Clayton Adams in 1988 and his 2.1 average was the best by a Duquesne player since Mike James averaged 2.2 spg. in 1993.

Played in 27 games and started 11 in Binghamton's run to the American East title and a trip to the NCAA Tournament...the Bearcats were 9-2 when he was in the starting lineup...averaged 4.4 points, 3.4 rebounds and 0.9 steals...one of team's top defensive players... played 27 minutes or more over last 11 games of season, BU was 10-1 during that stretch...started and played in 31 minutes, scoring three points, in NCAA First Round game against Duke.
