PLAYERS TO WATCH



ANTHONY GOODS

Sr. • G • Stanford

For the second year in a row, Anthony Goods has received All-Pac-10 Honorable Mention honors, falling among the top in the conference for scoring, free

throws and three-pointers made. Goods averaged a team-best 16.3 points per game along with 3.4 rebounds in the regular season. He posted team-high marks from three-point territory (66-169, 39.1 percent) and led the Cardinal in scoring on 14 occasions. His performance at the foul line nearly equaled the production over his first three seasons combined (134-169, 79.3 percent).



CALVIN HAYNES

So. • G • Oregon State

Coming off an explosive freshman debut, Haynes spent his sophomore season solidifying himself as one of the conference's top scorers.

Haynes earned First Team All-Pac-10 accolades by averaging 14.1 points per game and placing himself among the Top 20 in the conference. Haynes scored a career high 24 points to lead his team to a win over Seattle in December. Aside from scoring, Haynes contributed 3.5 rebounds and 1.5 assists per game and a total of 26 steals for the season.

Richmond has gotten hot shooting from their backcourt: guards Kevin Anderson and David Gonzalez. In their two wins so far, Anderson has back-to-back 20-point performances (41 points total). Gonzalez scored 27 points in the First Round win over St. John's and added 15 points in Monday's win over Charleston.

UTEP has a road win at Nevada (79-77) and a home victory against Northeastern (75-66). The wins have been marked by the strong play of guard Stefan Jackson, who has scored 26 points in each of the Miners' two wins. Randy Culpepper has also been a key reserve for UTEP with 37 points total, including 21 points in Monday's win over Northeastern.

Both teams, Richmond (49%) and UTEP (48%), have shot the ball well in the tournament.

ABOUT STANFORD – Head Coach Johnny Dawkins has Stanford in the postseason in his first year as head coach, continuing the Cardinal's streak of 16 straight years with a postseason appearance. Stanford is led by seniors Anthony Goods and Lawrence Hill, both of whom received All-Conference honors for the second time in their careers. Freshman Jeremy Green also earned a spot on the Pac-10 All-Freshman Team, averaging 6.0 points per game and 2.2 rebounds during the regular season.

HOW THEY GOT HERE – Stanford has looked strong in their two wins. They beat Boise State, 96-76, in the First Round and then knocked off Wichita State, 70-56, leading by as many as 20 points in the first half. Lawrence Hill leads the scoring for the Cardinal, averaging 19.5 ppg in the wins. Guard Anthony Goods is also chipping in with 13.5 ppg in the CBI Tournament so far.

HEAD COACH – Craig Robinson (first season), 15-17 (.468) at Oregon State

ABOUT OREGON STATE – First year Head Coach Craig Robinson led the Beavers to the fifth best single season turnaround in Pac-10 history. After the Beavers went 0-18 in conference play a year ago, Robinson came to Corvallis and led his new team to a 7-11 conference record, including a sweep of the Bay Area schools (Stanford & Cal). Oregon State placed three players on the All-Conference team, including Seth Tarver, who became the first Oregon State player to lead the Pac-10 in steals since Gary Payton in the 1989-90 season.

HOW THEY GOT HERE – The Beavers have slugged it out with Houston and Vermont, but came up on the winning side in both games. A not-so-pretty 49-45 win over the Cougars gave Oregon State a shot at Vermont. Beavers' guard Calvin Haynes led the team with 19 points, off the bench, including the game-winner with :06 seconds left in overtime for a 71-70 win. The balanced Oregon State attack had four players score in double-figures, including forward Roeland Schaftenaar who had 14 points and 10 rebounds against the Catamounts.

ABOUT THE CBI

The College Basketball Invitational (CBI) provides a meaningful opportunity for teams that are deserving of a postseason experience. Sixteen teams compete in this new postseason event, hosted at on-campus arenas throughout the country.

The CBI is a single-elimination tournament, up until the Championship Series, with all games played at campus sites. The Championship Series is a best of three series.

The event features eight first-round games, four second-round (or quarterfinal) games, a semifinal round and then a Championship Series.

Bracketing is conducted geographically into four regions of the country (East, West, South, Midwest) to minimize missed class time. The goal of the brackets is to create a competitive balance within each region. The final process takes place after the NCAA Tournament field is announced.

The 16-team field consists of teams not selected for the NCAA Tournament. Teams are invited based upon performance during their conference and non-conference schedule, as well as how well the team is playing at the end of the regular season.

2009 CBI TOURNAMENT NOTES

Bigger And Bigger – The 2009 CBI Tournament has already recorded two of its Top Five attended games in the brief history of the event. The crowd of 8,812 for the Stanford-Wichita State game on March 23rd was the second largest crowd in tournament history. On the same night, UTEP drew 7,798 fans for their game against Northeastern, the fourth largest crowd in the event.

Down To The Wire – The 2008 College Basketball Invitational had the most competitive games among the three postseason tournaments...

- 7.0 – average margin of victory in CBI
- 9.9 – average margin of victory in NIT
- 12.7 – average margin of victory in NCAA

Wins, Wins and More Wins – CBI Tournament teams are averaging 20.1 wins overall and 10.1 wins in conference play.

Conference Call – For the second straight year, the CBI included teams from 13 different conferences. Three conferences, WAC (Nevada, Boise State), Conference USA (UTEP, Houston) and the Pac-10 Conference (Oregon State, Stanford), received multiple bids.

Quarterfinals Call – The four teams in the Quarterfinal Round have combined for 78 wins, an average of 19.5 wins this season. Three of the four teams (Richmond, UTEP and Stanford) have at least 20 wins this season.

Conference Honors – The 16-team field for the 2009 College Basketball Invitational featured 26 players that received all-conference recognition, including 10 First-Team selections.

Just Win, Baby – This is the first time that an Oregon State basketball team has won two postseason games in the same

year since 1982-83, when Head Coach Ralph Miller took the Beavers to the West Regional finals of the NCAA Tournament.

20-20 Vision – With their win on Monday, Richmond reached the 20-win plateau for the first time since their 2003-04 team made the NCAA Tournament. **It is the first 20-win campaign at Richmond for Head Coach Chris Mooney.**

Common Thread – If Oregon State and Richmond win their games on Wednesday, it will give an All-Princeton look to the CBI Championship Series. Both head coaches, Craig Robinson and Chris Mooney, played at Princeton for legendary Head Coach Pete Carril.

Four Corners – The matchup between Oregon State and Stanford will be the fourth time this season that the Beavers and Cardinal have faced off against each other. Oregon State won both regular season matchups (77-62 on January 24th, 66-54 on February 19th), but Stanford came back for a 62-54 win in the Pac-10 Tournament on March 11th.

Scoring Machine – UTEP guard Stefan Jackson continues to add to his career point total, which now stands at 2,351 after consecutive 26-point efforts in the CBI Tournament against Nevada and Northeastern. His career total is the most in Conference USA history.

Young Bucks – The four head coaches in the CBI Semifinals have certainly distinguished themselves on the court, but are all somewhat new to being head coaches. Stanford's Johnny Dawkins is in his first year at the helm of the Cardinal. Oregon State's Craig Robinson is in his third year overall as a head coach (first with the Beavers). Richmond's Chris Mooney is in his fifth year overall. UTEP's Tony Barbee is in his third year as a head coach at UTEP.
