PLAYERS TO WATCH



DOUGLAS DAVIS

So. • G • Princeton

Second-team All-Ivy League selection...leads a balanced Princeton scoring attack with a 12.9 points per game average... last season, he became the first

freshman since the beginning of rookie eligibility in 1978-79 to lead the Tigers in scoring...his 120 three-pointers through his first two seasons are more than any Tiger since Brian Earl in 1997...his 706 career points is the highest two-season total since Chris Young had 801 points 10 years ago...in more than 30 years of freshman eligibility, only Young and second-leading all-time career scorer Kit Mueller (756) have had more points before their junior seasons.



ROBERT GLENN

Sr. • F • IUPUI

Named a first-team all-conference performer by the coaches of the Summit League...leads the Jaguars with an overall scoring average of 19.5 ppg...he also

leads the team in rebounding (6.4 rpg) and blocks (4.5)...he was named the league's Player of the Week six different times, marking the most by a league player since the 1990-91 season...he is just the fifth player in school history to have scored 1,000 points in just two seasons and the sixth to reach that mark exclusively at the Division I level.

Charleston vs. Virginia Commonwealth • 7 p.m. ET

Charleston is 22-11, marking the third time in four years under head coach Bobby Cremins that they achieved a 20-win season. VCU is 23-9 this season and is led by the Colonial Athletic Association's Defensive Player of the Year and first-team all-conference pick Larry Sanders.

MSU is 24-10, the second-most wins in school history. The 24-10 record also gives MSU its first back-to-back 20-win seasons in history. BU is 20-13, its 12th 20-win season and first since 2004-05.

Green Bay vs. Saint Louis • 9 p.m. ET
Chaifetz Arena • St. Louis, Mo.

Head coach Tod Kowalczyk has led UWGB to a 22-12 mark and back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time in 14 years. Meanwhile, SLU, under the direction of head coach Rick Majerus, is 21-11 despite being the youngest team in the country.

ABOUT PRINCETON - The Tigers are 21-8 and are led by tandem of sophomore Douglas Davis and junior Dan Mavraides, both of whom were named to the All-Ivy League second-team...Davis leads the Tigers in scoring with a 12.9 ppg average, while Mavraides is tallying 11.4 ppg to go along with a team-best 4.3 rebounds a game...the Tigers, as is their custom, are stingy on defense, yielding just 52.2 ppg...second-year head coach Sydney Johnson took over a program that had won 11 games prior to his arrival and in two short years has won 20 for the first time since the 2003-04 season.

HOW THEY GOT HERE - Princeton emerged with a 65-51 win over Duquesne. The Tigers were paced by Douglas Davis and his 16 points. Kareem Maddox tallied 15 points and Ian Hummer added 14 points.

ABOUT IUPUI - Senior Robert Glenn and sophomore Alex Young pace the Jaguars, who own a 25-10 record in 2009-10 - the most wins of any CBI team...Glenn (19.9 ppg, 6.4 rpg) and Young (18.4 ppg, 4.6 rpg) both earned first-team All-Summit League honors, becoming IUPUI's first first-team duo since both Brandon Cole and George Hill were honored in 2005-06 and just the second tandem in school history to earn the distinction...senior Jon Avery was named the Summit's Sixth Man of the Year, coming off the bench in all 35 games to average 8.0 ppg and 4.3 rpg to go along with 39 steals.

HOW THEY GOT HERE - Robert Glenn exploded for 32 points and IUPUI jumped out to a 21-2 lead in beating Hofstra, 74-60. Glenn was 9-18 from the field and 14-17 from the foul line as the Jaguars move on to host Princeton in Monday's quarterfinals.

ABOUT THE CBI

The College Basketball Invitational (CBI) provides a meaningful opportunity for teams that deserve a postseason experience. Sixteen teams compete in this three-year-old postseason event, hosted at on-campus arenas throughout the country.

The CBI is a single-elimination tournament up until the Championship Series, with all games played at campus sites. The Championship Series is a best-of-three series.

The event features eight first-round games, four quarterfinal round games, a semifinal round, and then the Championship Series.

The goal of the brackets is to create a competitive balance within each bracket and to minimize missed class time. The final process takes place after the NCAA Tournament field is announced.

The 16-team field consists of teams not selected for the NCAA Tournament. Teams are invited based upon performance during their conference and non-conference schedules, as well as how well the team is playing at the end of the regular season.

2010 CBI TOURNAMENT NOTES

Third Annual CBI – The third annual College Basketball Invitational tipped off on March 16 with a pair of Opening Round games, with six additional Opening Round games played on March 17. The Quarterfinals commence on Monday, March 22, followed by Semifinal Round action on Wednesday, March 24.

The unique quality of the CBI is it's best-of-three Championship Round, which will be held March 29, March 31, and April 2. The highest remaining seed would host two games should a third game be necessary. In each of the first two CBIs, the Championship Round went the full three games.

The Next Step – Three members of the 2010 CBI field – Oregon State, Charleston, and Green Bay – participated in last year's CBI. There are now seven programs that have been to multiple CBI events. Of the four which played in 2008 and 2009 – Houston, Nevada, Richmond, and UTEP – Houston, Richmond, and UTEP made the 2010 NCAA Tournament. Houston, which advanced to the 2008 CBI semifinals before losing its Opening Round game in 2009, used the CBI to catapult itself into the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1992. Richmond, which went to the 2009 CBI semis, reached the NAAs for the first time since 2004. UTEP, the 2009 CBI runner-up, earned its first trip to the NCAA Tournament since 2005.

Did You Know – Tulsa (2008) and Oregon State (2009) won the first two College Basketball Invitationals. Both series went the distance as Tulsa won Games 1 and 3 against Bradley in 2008 and Oregon State did the same in 2009 against UTEP.

Fantastic – 172,474 fans attended games at the first two CBI Tournaments. In both years, the final two games

of the Championship Series were played before sellout crowds of 9,014 at Bradley (2008), 8,455 at Tulsa (2008), and 12,000 at UTEP (2009).

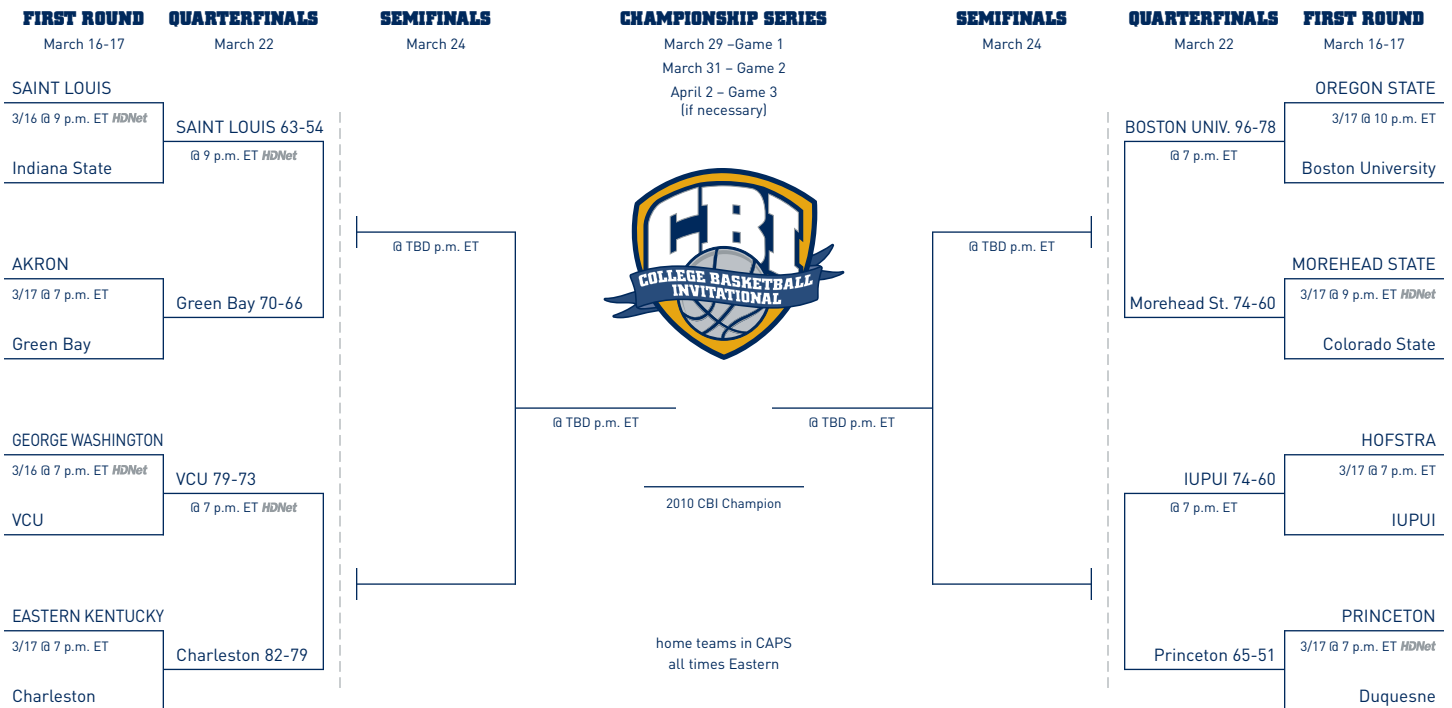
Manning Up – If you want defense, you have come to the right place. The 2010 CBI will feature no less than five players who were named their league's Defensive Player of the Year. Charleston's Jeremy Simmons (co-Defensive Player) (Southern), Duquesne's Damian Saunders (Atlantic 10), Morehead State's Kenneth Faried (Ohio Valley), Oregon State's Seth Tarver (Pac-10), and VCU's Larry Sanders (CAA) all garnered the award.

In addition to being named Defensive Player of the Year, Faried was named the Ohio Valley Conference's Player of the Year. Hofstra's Charles Jenkins enters the CBI as the Player of the Year in the Colonial Athletic Association. Alex Young of IUPUI was the Sixth Man of the Year in the Summit League.

Home Rule...Not This Year – Home teams posted a 23-11 record in the first two College Basketball Invitationals. In 2008, home teams were 13-4, including 3-0 in the Championship Series. In 2009, home teams were 10-7 with Oregon State winning the CBI title on UTEP's home floor. However, this year home teams are just 3-5 on their floors. Only Morehead State, Princeton, and Saint Louis have won their home games.

Win, Baby, Win – Nine teams in this year's CBI field earned CBI bids with at least 20 wins during the 2009-10 season, seven of which won their Opening Round games. Akron and IUPUI led the way with 24 victories apiece. (IUPUI is now at 25.) They are joined by Morehead State (24) VCU (23), Charleston (22), Green Bay (22), Princeton (21), Saint Louis (21), and Eastern Kentucky (20). With its 96-78 win at Oregon State, Boston University has now won 20 games.
