### PLAYERS TO WATCH



#### LARRY SANDERS

Jr. • F • Virginia Commonwealth

Named the Colonial Athletic Association's Defensive Player of the Year...he also earned a spot on the all-conference first-team...he is only the

second player in CAA history to earn back-to-back Defensive Player of the Year laurels...entered the CBI third in the conference and 24th in the nation in blocks...in less than three seasons, Sanders has moved up to fourth on the CAA's all-time blocked shots list...he leads the conference in rebounding with 9.3 rebounds per game...he grabbed double-digit rebounds 14 times this season.



#### KWAMAIN MITCHELL

So. • G • Saint Louis

Earned second-team All-Atlantic 10 Conference in 2009-10...leads the Billikens with a 16.1 ppg average while his 102 assists place him second

on the team...Mitchell seems to be his best at home, leading the Billikens to a 32-4 record at the new Chaifetz Arena when he is in the lineup...SLU is also 10-0 when he scores 20 or more points... Mitchell was named to the Atlantic 10 All-Rookie team last season...last season he set the Saint Louis freshman record with 113 assists and is the cornerstone of the school's rebuilding effort.

### CBI CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES GAME 1 RECAP

VCU 68, Saint Louis 56

Verizon Wireless Arena • Richmond, Va.

Joey Rodriguez scored 14 straight points for VCU to increase a three-point lead to a 13-point lead as the Rams earned a 68-56 win over Saint Louis on Monday in the first game of the CBI Championship Series at Verizon Wireless Arena at the Stuart C. Siegel Center.

Rodriguez ended the night with a game-high 22 points to go along with six assists. In a span of 2:04, Rodriguez outscored Saint Louis 14-4 to give VCU a 55-42 lead with 12:11 remaining in the game. Larry Sanders netted 20 points and had 12 rebounds and four blocked shots. The Rams converted 16 Billiken turnovers into 25 points en route to their 18th home win in 19 games.

Saint Louis received 11 points from Willie Reed and 10 points apiece from Kwamain Mitchell and Cody Ellis.

**ABOUT VCU** - The Rams are 26-9 this season and are led by the CAA's Defensive Player of the Year and first-team all-conference selection Larry Sanders...the junior tops VCU with 14.7 ppg and 9.3 rpg averages...he also leads the Rams with 88 blocked shots...Sanders is joined on the all-conference team by classmate Joey Rodriguez, who garnered second-team laurels...Rodriguez is second to Sanders with his 12.9 ppg average while his 206 assists and 66 steals top the list...under first-year head coach Shaka Smart, the Rams have recorded their third straight 20-win season...with its win over Saint Louis, VCU earned its 202nd victory over the past nine seasons, dating back to 2001-02...that is by far the most among all Division I institutions in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

**HOW THEY GOT HERE** - Opening Round - 79-73 win at George Washington...Quarterfinal Round - 93-86 win vs. Charleston... Semifinal Round - 88-75 win vs. Boston University...Championship Series - 68-56 win vs. Saint Louis...FYI: VCU is netting 82.0 ppg while yielding 74.3 ppg in the CBI.

**ABOUT SAINT LOUIS** - The Billikens, under the direction of head coach Rick Majerus, are the youngest team in the country, with no seniors or juniors on the active roster...SLU is 23-12 after being predicted to finish 12th in the Atlantic 10's preseason poll...the 23 wins match the most since a 23-8 campaign in 1994-95...Kwamain Mitchell leads the Billikens with his 16.1 ppg average and 49 steals...for his efforts he was named to the A-10 all-conference second-team...sophomore Willie Reed nets 12.3 ppg and leads the Bills with an 8.0 rpg average and 70 blocks in garnering honorable mention all-conference acclaim... freshman Cody Ellis, who averages 10.8 points and 5.0 rebounds a game, was named to the all-rookie team...sophomore Kyle Cassidy leads the Billikens with a 3.2 assists per game average...he also scores 6.2 points a game...SLU allows only 59.9 ppg and opponents are shooting just 40.0 percent from the field and 28.7 percent from three-point range on the year.

## ABOUT THE CBI

The College Basketball Invitational (CBI) provides a meaningful opportunity for teams that deserve a postseason experience. Sixteen teams compete in this three-year-old postseason event, hosted at on-campus arenas throughout the country.

The CBI is a single-elimination tournament up until the Championship Series, with all games played at campus sites. The Championship Series is a best-of-three series.

The event features eight first-round games, four quarterfinal round games, a semifinal round, and then the Championship Series.

The goal of the brackets is to create a competitive balance within each bracket and to minimize missed class time. The final process takes place after the NCAA Tournament field is announced.

The 16-team field consists of teams not selected for the NCAA Tournament. Teams are invited based upon performance during their conference and non-conference schedules, as well as how well the team is playing at the end of the regular season.

## 2010 CBI TOURNAMENT NOTES

**Third Annual CBI** – The Championship Series of the third annual College Basketball Invitational tipped off at Virginia Commonwealth on March 29 with VCU earning a 68-56 victory. It continues at Saint Louis on March 31 and April 2 should a third game be necessary. In each of the first two CBIs, the Championship Series went the full three games.

**The Next Step** – Three members of the 2010 CBI field - Oregon State, Charleston, and Green Bay - participated in last year's CBI. There are now seven programs that have been to multiple CBI events. Of the four which played in 2008 and 2009 - Houston, Nevada, Richmond, and UTEP - Houston, Richmond, and UTEP made the 2010 NCAA Tournament. Houston, which advanced to the 2008 CBI semifinals before losing its Opening Round game in 2009, used its CBI experience to catapult itself into the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1992. Richmond, which went to the 2009 CBI semis, reached the NAAs for the first time since 2004. UTEP, the 2009 CBI runner-up, earned its first trip to the NCAA Tournament since 2005.

**Home Sweet Home** – If history is any indication, the home team is in good shape in the CBI Championship Series. Including VCU's 68-56 win on Monday, home teams in the Championship Series are 6-1. In 2008, Tulsa won its two home games and Bradley won its home game. In 2009, Oregon State won its only home game then, after losing at UTEP in Game 2 of the Championship Series, won at UTEP, 81-73, to capture the title. Prior to Monday, no game in the Championship Series had ever been decided by more than nine points.

**Extra Sessions** – Prior to the Quarterfinal Round, only two games in the brief history of the CBI went into overtime. The first was in last year's Quarterfinal Round when Oregon State and Vermont needed five more minutes to decide their

game, which the Beavers won, 71-70, on March 23, 2009. Then two nights later, Oregon State needed extra time to beat Stanford, 65-62, in the Semifinal Round. In this year's Quarterfinal Round on March 22, three of the four games went into extra sessions, with two of those going into double overtime. Saint Louis beat Green Bay (68-62) and Princeton downed IUPUI (74-68) in 50 minutes while Boston University needed 45 minutes to take out Morehead State (91-89).

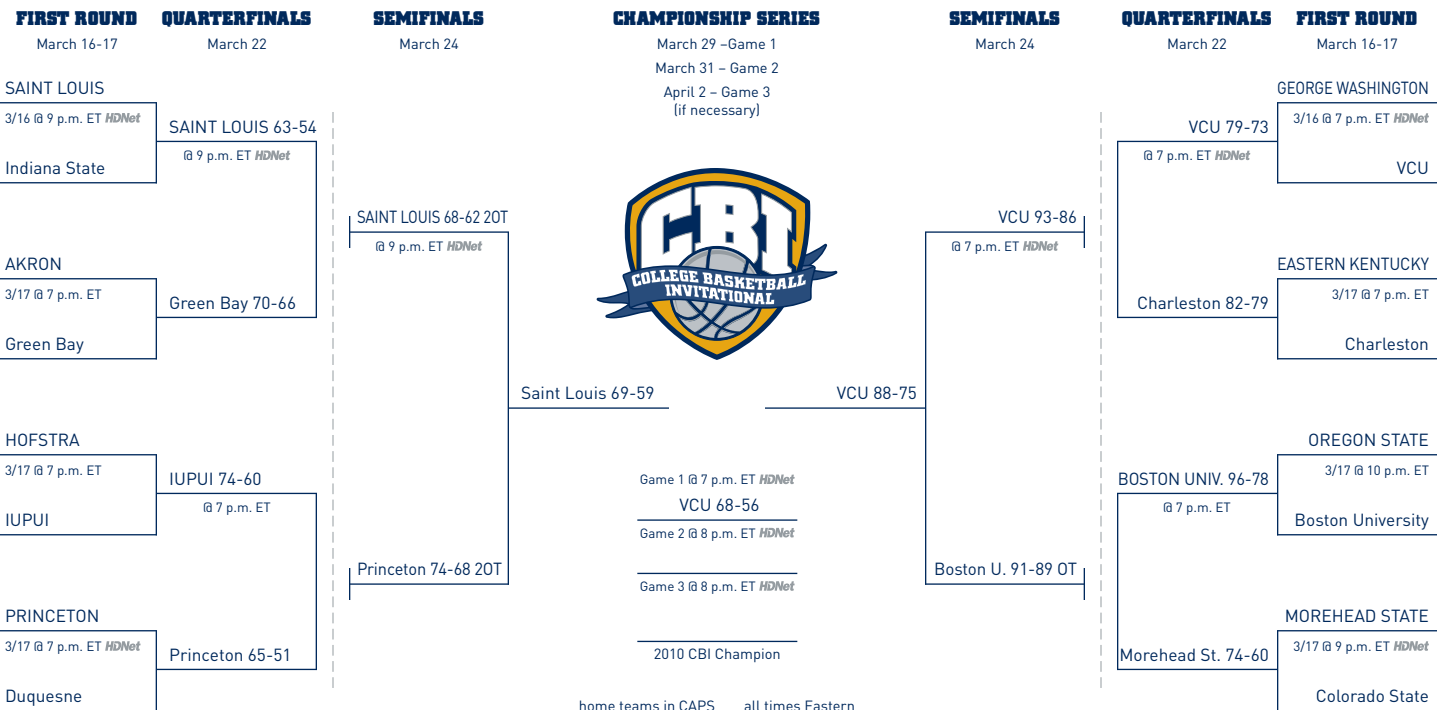
**Manning Up** – If you want defense, you have come to the right place. The 2010 CBI features no less than five players who were named their league's Defensive Player of the Year. Charleston's Jeremy Simmons (co-Defensive Player) [Southern], Duquesne's Damian Saunders (Atlantic 10), Morehead State's Kenneth Faried (Ohio Valley), Oregon State's Seth Tarver (Pac-10), and VCU's Larry Sanders (CAA) all garnered the award.

In addition to being named Defensive Player of the Year, Faried was named the Ohio Valley Conference's Player of the Year. Hofstra's Charles Jenkins entered the CBI as the Player of the Year in the Colonial Athletic Association. Alex Young of IUPUI was the Sixth Man of the Year in the Summit League.

In all, 25 players in this year's CBI earned all-conference honors, including 11 first-team selections.

**Win, Baby, Win** – Nine teams in this year's CBI field entered the CBI with at least 20 wins during the 2009-10 season, seven of which won their Opening Round games. Akron and IUPUI led the way with 24 victories apiece. (IUPUI is now at 25.) They are joined by VCU (25), Morehead State (24), Saint Louis (23), Charleston (22), Green Bay (22), Princeton (22), and Eastern Kentucky (20). Its 96-78 win at Oregon State was Boston University's 20th. The Terriers ended the season with 21 wins.
