THE MAIN EVENT: The Progressive CBE Classic is the nation's most exciting season-opening college basketball tournament. Twelve teams from across the nation compete in the 11th annual event with Missouri, Notre Dame, California, and Georgia having served as Regional Round hosts. Regional action took place from Nov. 13-17 with the four hosts advancing to the Championship Rounds, Nov. 21-22, at Sprint Center in Kansas City, Mo.. The remainder of the field will participate in subregionals held at Bowling Green, Ohio, and Macon, Ga., Nov. 21-23.

Joining the four Championship Round hosts in the Progressive CBE Classic are Austin Peay, Bowling Green, Detroit, George Washington, Mercer, Niagara, Sam Houston State, and South Dakota State.

PROGRESSIVE CBE CLASSIC

PRESEASON ATTENTION - TEAM DIVISION: Both California and Missouri appear in the ESPN/USA Today and Associated Press preseason polls. Cal is No. 22 in the coaches' poll and No. 23 in the writers' poll. Mizzou is ranked No. 25 by the coaches and No. 24 by the writers. Cal was last ranked in the preseason in 2009 when they were slated at No. 12. Missouri was No. 15 in both preseason polls a year ago.

PRESEASON ATTENTION - INDIVIDUAL DIVISION: Several players participating in the 2011 Progressive CBE Classic were among the 50 players on the John R. Wooden Award preseason watch list. Included on the list are Tim Abromaitis of Notre Dame, Cal's Allen Crabbe and Jorge Gutierrez, Marcus Denmon of Missouri, and Detroit's Ray McCallum.

HOME SWEET HOME: This year marks the 11th consecutive year that Kansas City will serve as host of the Championship Rounds of the Progressive CBE Classic. The first year (2001) the event was held at Kemper Arena before moving to the fabled Municipal Auditorium from 2002-2006. In 2007, the Classic moved into the beautiful Sprint Center.

WELCOME BACK: Five teams in the 12-team field of the Progressive CBE Classic are making a return visit. Missouri is making its record-setting fourth appearance in the event, having previously participated in 2001, 2004, and 2007. The Tigers won the inaugural event in 2001 and placed third in 2004 and 2007. Notre Dame (2002 runner-up), Detroit (2006), Sam Houston (2004), and South Dakota State (2005) are each playing in the event for the second time.

PUNCH YOUR TICKET: Since the beginning of the Classic in 2001, every team that has won the Championship has gone on to the NCAA Tournament. That trend continued in 2010 with Duke winning last year's event and eventually advancing to the Sweet 16. UCLA, which won the CBE Classic in 2007, became the first Classic champion to advance to the Final Four in 2008.

HELPFUL START: Fifty-three teams that have participated in the Progressive CBE Classic have gone on to postseason play that year – 34 NCAA, 11 NIT, six CBI, and two CIT. Last year alone nine of the 12 teams in the event earned postseason berths with seven going to the NCAA Tournament and two to the CBI. Duke, Marquette and San Diego State each reached the Sweet 16. In all, eight teams have advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament after opening their seasons in the event, with UCLA moving on to the 2008 Final Four. Tulsa, which played in the 2007 tournament, won the 2008 CBI. Memphis, which was a member of the inaugural Guardians Classic field in 2001, earned the 2002 NIT title.

CATAPULTING INTO THE RANKINGS: The Classic has catapulted several teams into the national rankings based on their performance in the event. In 2002, Notre Dame advanced to the title game of the Classic before dropping a five-point decision to Creighton. However, the voters were impressed enough with the Fighting Irish that two weeks later, they would go from being unranked to No. 10 in the Associated Press poll and No. 15 in the ESPN/USA Today poll. Syracuse was also unranked at the time of

the 2008 CBE Classic but its 89-81 overtime win over No. 23 Kansas put the Orange in both polls – No. 16 by the writers and No. 20 by the coaches. Last year, San Diego State was unranked in the coaches' poll but after winning four games, the Aztecs were rated No. 19 after the CBE Classic.

THE MAN: It occurred in the very first Guardians Classic but it remains the standard today. In his only year of collegiate basketball, Memphis' Dajuan Wagner left quite an impression. Wagner set five tournament records that still stand today, including most points in the championship rounds (47) and tournament (97). He also holds the records for most field goals in the championship rounds (40) and tournament (78), as well as most free throws in a tournament (29). His 32 points against Old Dominion was the tournament standard until last year.

SELECT COMPANY: In the last four NBA drafts, 30 players who have played in the Progressive CBE Classic have been selected. The 2011 NBA Draft saw eight Classic alumni chosen, including 2010 CBE Classic MVP Kyrie Irving of Duke being selected No. 1 overall.

THE UNTOUCHABLES: Of the 121 teams that have participated in the event since 2001, only eight remain undefeated in Classic play. Creighton was crowned the Guardians champion in 2002 and 2004 and Texas earned the 2005 and 2009 CBE Classics in compiling 8-0 records in event play. South Carolina (2003), UCLA (2007), Syracuse (2008), and San Diego State (2010) have all posted 4-0 records. California (2011) and Georgia (2011) and 2-0

HOSTS WITH THE MOST: The hosts of the four regional sites of the Progressive CBE Classic combined for an 89-45 record, including a 58-11 mark at home, three NCAA Tournament bids and one NIT bid last season.

KANSAS CITY HERE I COME: Six student-athletes from the Kansas City metropolitan area will participate in the Progressive CBE Classic with five of them advancing to Sprint Center. In addition, California's Ricky Kreklow played last season at Missouri.

HOW THEY GOT HERE...

In Austin, J'Covan Brown tied his career high with 28 points and set a career high with eight assists in leading Texas to an 82-46 win over Boston University. Julien Lewis scored 18 points and made four 3-pointers, with several of his baskets coming off assists from Brown. Darryl Partin scored 14 points to lead Boston University.

In game 2 Brown again surpassed his career high with 35 points to propel Texas to a 100-90 victory over Rhode Island. The junior guard added six assists with no turnovers. Jamal Wilson led the Rams (0-2) with 24 points.

In Nashville, D'Aundray Brown had 18 points, eight rebounds, and seven steals as Cleveland State opened by upsetting No. 7 Vanderbilt 71-58. John Jenkins, the Southeastern Conference's leading scorer with 19.5 points last season, had 17 for Vanderbilt. Lance Goulbourne added 11.

Jeffrey Taylor led five Commodores in double figures as No. 20 Vanderbilt earned an 80-68 win over Bucknell Taylor scored a team-best 14 points to go along with six rebounds. Brad Tinsley, Lance Goulbourne, and Kedren Johnson each scored 12 points with Goulbourne hauling down a game-high nine rebounds. Rod Odom tallied 10 points. The Bison were led by Joe Willman and his game-high 17 points.

In Raleigh, junior Richard Howell scored a career-high 25 points to lead NC State to a 91-61 victory over Morehead State. DeShawn Painter also had a career high with 19 points.

Painter's turnaround jumper from the top of the key with 4.2 seconds remaining capped NC State's comeback win over Princeton 60-58 at the RBC Center. The game-winner gave Painter 11 points on 4-8 shooting. C.J. Williams and Richard Howell joined Brown and Painter in double figures with 10 points apiece in the victory. Howell's nine rebounds led the Pack. Douglas Davis ended with 21 points for Princeton.

In Corvallis, Oregon State placed five players in double figures as the Beavers earned a 93-60 win over West Alabama. Jared Cunningham scored 17 points and was joined in double figures by Joe Burton (14 points), Devon Collier (14 points), Angus Brandt (13 points), and Ahmad Starks (10 points). Jared Woolfolk led West Alabama with 16 points.

Cunningham then exploded for 35 points and Collier scored 25 points to lead Oregon State to an 82-72 win over Hofstra. Mike Moore led Hofstra with 16 points, while David Imes tallied 15 points and seven rebounds.

HALL OF FAME

Eight legends will be inducted into the National Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame on Sunday, November 20. The National Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame, which is located in the College Basketball Experience in Kansas City, opened in October 2007. Below is a brief look at this year's inductees:

Eddie Einhorn, Contributor - In 1958 Einhorn produced a nationally syndicated radio broadcast of the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship. Ten years later – after founding the TVS Television Network to market college games to regional networks – he was instrumental in arranging the "Game of the Century" between Houston and UCLA in the Astrodome, a game that is largely credited with spurring the popularity and growth of the sport on television.

Bob Knight, Coach - Recorded 902 wins during his coaching tenure at first Army then Indiana and finally Texas Tech. His Indiana squads won three NCAA national championships. He is a four-time national Coach of the Year and coached the 1984 United States Olympic men's basketball team to a gold medal.

Chris Mullin, Player - Mullin is the leading scorer in St. John's history with more than 2,400 points. He led St. John's to the 1985 NCAA Final Four, where the team lost to fellow Big East Conference member Georgetown in the national semifinals. Mullin was a two-time Big East Player of the Year and first-team All-American in addition to being named the John R. Wooden Award winner in 1985 as the national Player of the Year. He was also a member of both the 1984 and 1992 gold-medal winning U.S. Olympic teams.

Cazzie Russell, Player - A member of the 1965 NCAA Final Four all-tournament team, Russell was a three-time all-American and two-time Big Ten Player of the Year for Michigan. He led the Wolverines to two appearances in the Final Four. Michigan lost to Duke in the 1964 national semifinals and to UCLA in the 1965 championship game. Russell averaged 27 points and nine rebounds over his three-year career.

Ralph Sampson, Player - Sampson is one of only two players to win the Naismith Award as Player of the Year three times (the other is Bill Walton of UCLA). The 7-4 center led Virginia to a National Invitation Tournament championship in 1980 as a freshman and an NCAA Final Four appearance in 1981 as a sophomore. A three-time Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year, Sampson was voted one of the 50 greatest players in ACC history.

Eddie Sutton, Coach - A four-time coach of the year, Sutton recorded 804 wins during his 36-year coaching career. He was the first coach to take four different teams to the NCAA Tournament, doing so with Creighton, Arkansas, and Kentucky before taking his alma mater Oklahoma State. His Cowboys teams reached the NCAA Final Four in 1995 and 2004.

PROGRESSIVE CBE CLASSIC

Joe Vancisin, Contributor - Served as head coach at Yale for 19 seasons, leading the Bulldogs to two Ivy League titles and two NCAA Tournament appearances. He left Yale in 1975 to become the NABC's executive director for 17 years before his retirement in 1992. Under his leadership, the NABC debuted its college all-star game at the NCAA Final Four, elected its first African American president in Georgetown's John Thompson and adopted a code of ethics.

James Worthy, Player - The 1982 Helms Foundation National Player of the Year will forever be remembered for being in the right place at the right time as Georgetown's Freddie Brown threw an errant pass directly to Worthy, sealing a 63-62 victory for North Carolina in the 1982 NCAA title game. Worthy scored 28 points and was named the tournament's most outstanding player.

THE FIELD

Missouri Tigers (#25/#24)

Head Coach: Frank Haith

Big 12 Conference



Has been to three straight NCAA Tournaments...the Tigers' 77 wins over the last three years are among the most in the country during that time period...return 10 players, including all five starters, from last year's 23-11 squad...senior guard Marcus Denmon, a first-team All-Big 12 choice, led the Tigers in scoring (16.9 ppg) last year...senior forward Laurence Bowers, who was tops in rebounding (6.1 rpg) while also scoring 11.6 ppg, is lost for the year due to injury...first-year head coach Frank Haith led Miami to Top 25 rankings three of the last four seasons.

Notre Dame Fighting Irish

Head Coach: Mike Brey

Big East Conference



Has recorded five straight 20-win seasons...the Fighting Irish posted a 27-7 record last season en route to their fourth NCAA Tournament appearance in the last five years...graduate student Tim Abromaitis, Notre Dame's leading returning scorer (15.4 ppg) and rebounder (6.1 rpg) and a third-team All-Big East selection, heads an impressive group of returning players...he is joined by senior guard Scott Martin, who netted 9.7 ppg...head coach Mike Brey was named Big East Coach of the Year in 2010-11.

California Golden Bears (#22/#23)

Head Coach: Mike Montgomery

Pacific-12 Conference



Has posted two 20-win seasons and has earned three postseason berths in the three years since four-time Pac-10 Coach of the Year Mike Montgomery has been at the helm of the program...return 10 players who saw action last year, led by senior guard Jorge Gutierrez, a first-team All-Pac-10 pick who led the Bears in scoring (14.6 ppg) and assists (148)...senior forward Harper Kamp, a second-team all-league honoree, averaged 14.2 ppg and 5.6 rpg last season.

Georgia Bulldogs

Head Coach: Mark Fox

Southeastern Conference



In going 21-12 last season, the Bulldogs won 20 or more games for the first time since 1997-98 and went to their first NCAA Tournament since 2003...senior guard Dustin Ware led the Southeastern Conference and ranked fifth nationally in assist/turnover ratio (+3.67), tallied 8.0 ppg, and handed out 114 assists...back court classmate Gerald Robinson led Georgia with 133 assists while scoring 12.2 ppg...head coach Mark Fox, entering his third year at Georgia, has led his teams to six 20-win seasons in his seven years as a head coach.

Austin Peay Governors

Head Coach: Dave Loos

Ohio Valley Conference



Coming off a berth in the 2011 College Basketball Invitational, the Governors are led by first-team all-Ohio Valley Conference senior Tyshwan Edmondson and his 17.1 ppg average...redshirt junior Anthony Campbell, a 2009-10 second-team all-OVC choice, averaged 13.9 ppg a year ago before suffering a season-ending knee injury in December...head coach Dave Loos has been with Austin Peay over two decades, amassing more than 330 wins, including 20 last season.

Bowling Green Falcons

Head Coach: Louis Orr

Mid-American Conference



Seven players who started at least nine games a year ago return, including the team's top four scorers who combined to average 41.9 points last season...junior A'uston Calhoun (12.5 ppg) and senior Scott Thomas (11.2 ppg, 6.7 rpg), both 6-7 forwards, were named to the Mid-American Conference team last season...Louis Orr is in his fifth season as the Falcons' head coach...Bowling Green participated in the 2010 Legends Classic.

Detroit took part in 2010 Legends Classic.

PROGRESSIVE CBE CLASSIC

A HISTORY IN BRIEF

2001 – The inaugural Guardians Classic takes place on the campuses of Alabama, Iowa, Memphis, and Missouri with those four schools advancing to the Championship Rounds at Kansas City's Kemper Arena. Clarence Gilbert's free throw with 0.8 seconds remaining in the game gives No. 5 Missouri a 78-77 decision over No. 9 Iowa. Missouri would go on to advance to the NCAA Tournament's Elite Eight.

2002 – Tournament MVP Kyle Korver hits seven 3-pointers to lead Creighton to an 80-75 win over Notre Dame, leading the Blue Jays to the first of their two Classic titles. The 2002 Classic marked the first at Kansas City's venerable Municipal Auditorium.

2003 – South Carolina beats Southwest Missouri State and Richmond en route to the 2003 Guardians Classic title.

2004 – Tournament MVP Tyler McKinney hits a five-foot jumper with 4.2 seconds left to give Creighton a 65-63 overtime win versus Ohio State and its second Classic title in three years.

2005 – Behind MVP LaMarcus Aldridge, who had a pair of double-doubles in the Championship Rounds, second-ranked Texas beats No. 13 West Virginia and No. 17 Iowa to win the first of its two Classic crowns. 2005 also marked the first time since the inaugural Classic that all four Championship Round teams were nationally ranked. No. 7 Kentucky rounded out the field.

2006 – It's the last go-round at Municipal Auditorium and Marquette did it in style as the No. 17 Golden Eagles defeated No. 8 Duke, 73-62, behind Dominic James' season-high 25 points.

2007 – Playing in the brand new Sprint Center, top-ranked UCLA (ESPN/USA Today) beats Maryland and Michigan State to begin its road to a third-straight Final Four appearance. This also marked the beginning of O'Reilly Auto Parts' association with the event.

2008 – Syracuse rallied from a 13-point second half deficit and outscored defending National Champion and No. 23 Kansas 17-9 in overtime to emerge with an 89-81 win and the O'Reilly Auto Parts CBE Classic title.

2009 – No. 3 Texas cruises to four wins and its second Classic title. The Longhorns' average margin of victory in its four games is 30 points.

2010 – In his only collegiate season and before becoming the top pick in the 2011 NBA Draft, Kyrie Irving earns MVP honors in leading top-ranked Duke to the CBE title.

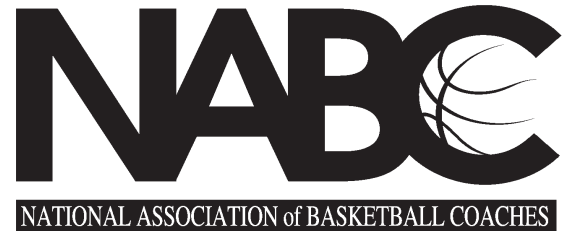

Some of these "fan experience" activities include participating in an ESPN play-by-play booth, where fans can make their own call on historical basketball plays.

The building was designed by ESI Design of New York City, whose previous exploits include The Unser Racing Museum in Albuquerque, N.M., and the Country Music Hall of Fame in Nashville, Tenn.
