

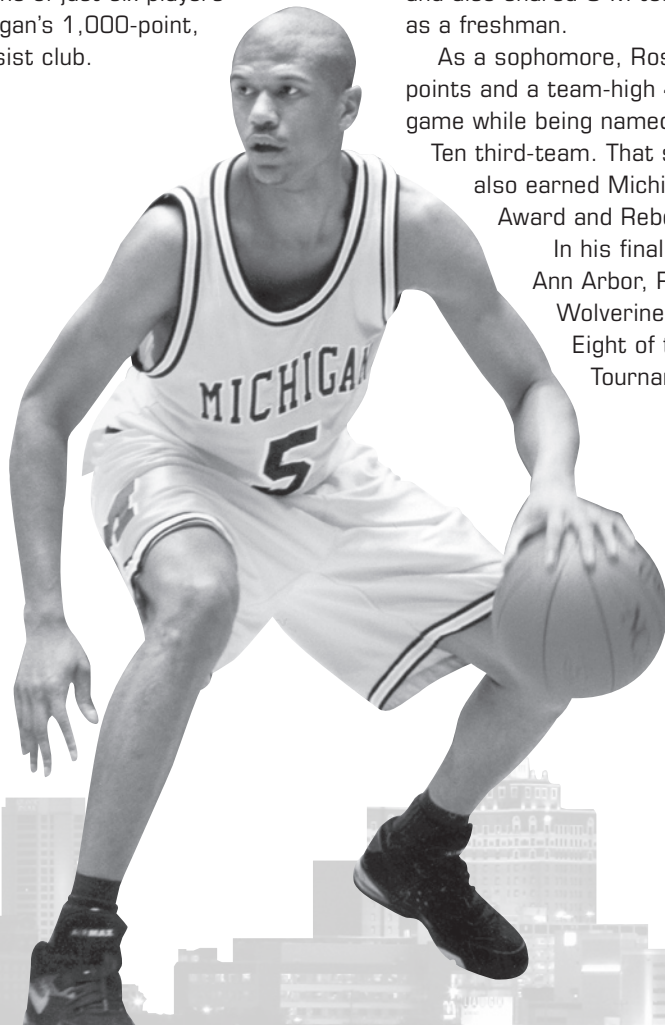

JALEN ROSE • UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN • PLAYER (1991-94)

A three-time All-Big Ten selection and two-time All-American during a remarkable collegiate career, Jalen Rose was the catalyst for one of the most famous teams in the history of college basketball.

A local product from Detroit Southwestern High School, the 6-8 guard set numerous U-M records in his three seasons in Ann Arbor. In his first season wearing the Maize and Blue, Rose scored 597 points, setting a Michigan freshman record that still stands today. He went on to score 1,788 points in his U-M career, the eighth-best mark in school history and the third-most by a player who played less than four seasons. In 102 career games played, Rose scored in double-figures an unbelievable 98 times and is one of just five U-M players to have scored at least 500 points in three different seasons.

Far from just a scorer, Rose is also seventh in Michigan history in assists with 401, as he led the Wolverines in that category in each of his three seasons, and is one of just six players in Michigan's 1,000-point, 400-assist club.

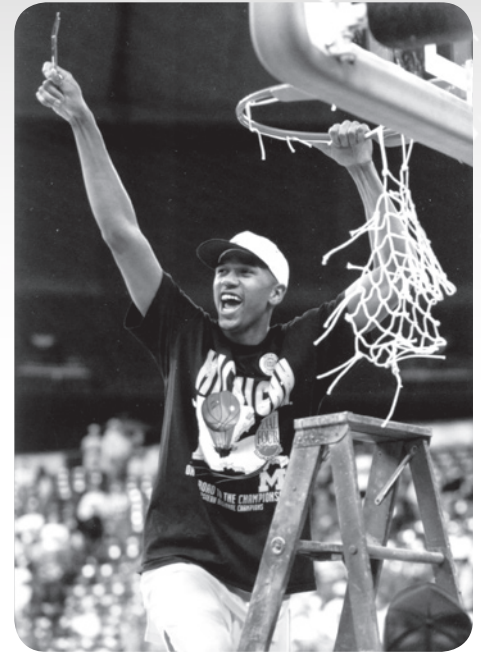


A starter in all but one game during his college career, Rose averaged 34.5 minutes per game as a Wolverine, the second-highest average in school history. His 3,520 minutes played is the most by a U-M player who played less than four seasons.

Rose averaged a team-best 17.6 points and 4.0 assists per game during his freshman season of 1991-92. He started 33 of 34 games that year with his lone appearance off the bench coming in the Big Ten opener at Iowa. Rose responded with a season-best 34 points against the Hawkeyes. In the 1992 NCAA Tournament, Rose jump-started Michigan's run to the Final Four, posting two double-doubles in the first three games of the tournament, including a season-best 10 assists in the second round against East Tennessee State. He went on to be named the Most Outstanding Player of the Southeast Regional and was named to the All-Tournament team. Rose was named to the All-Big Ten second-team and also shared U-M team MVP honors as a freshman.

As a sophomore, Rose averaged 15.5 points and a team-high 4.2 assists per game while being named to the All-Big Ten third-team. That season Rose also earned Michigan's Leadership Award and Rebounding Award.

In his final season in Ann Arbor, Rose led the Wolverines to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament while



averaging 19.9 points, 5.7 rebounds, and 3.9 assists per contest. Rose capped his stellar career as a Wolverine by being named to the All-Big Ten first-team.

The 13th overall selection in the 1994 NBA Draft by the Denver Nuggets, Rose played 13 seasons in the NBA, beginning with Denver and being named to the NBA All-Rookie second-team in 1994-95. He then moved on to Indiana, where he spent the next five and a half seasons and earned the NBA's Most Improved Player Award following the 1999-2000 season. That year, Rose started 80 games for the Pacers, averaging 18.2 points, 4.8 rebounds, and 4.0 assists a game as Indiana, which missed the playoffs his first season (1996-97), advanced to the 2000 NBA Finals where they lost in six games to the Los Angeles Lakers. In all, the Pacers would make four playoff appearances in Rose's time in Indianapolis.

His career then took him to Chicago, Toronto, New York, and Phoenix. When it was over, Rose had played 923 games and accumulated 13,220 points (14.3 ppg), 3,527 assists (3.8 apg), and 3,193 rebounds (3.5 rpg) in his NBA career.

Rose currently works for ESPN/ABC as a NBA studio analyst.
