THE MAIN EVENT: The 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer is the nation's premier season-opening college basketball tournament. Teams from across the nation will compete in the 17th annual event with St. John's, Arizona, Texas A&M, and Mississippi serving as regional hosts. Regional Round action takes place from Nov. 7-9 with the four hosts then advancing to the Championship Rounds, Nov. 17-18, at New York's Madison Square Garden. The remainder of the field will participate in Subregionals held in Lynchburg, Va., and Valparaiso, Ind., Nov. 18-20.

Joining the four Championship Round hosts in the 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer are Akron, Duquesne, Eastern Kentucky, Hiram, Indiana-Kokomo, Lehigh, Liberty, UDC, Valparaiso, and William & Mary.

ABOUT THE PROGRAM: The Coaches vs. Cancer program unites the American Cancer Society and the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) in the fight against cancer. The program leverages the personal experiences, community leadership, and professional excellence of basketball coaches nationwide to increase cancer awareness and promote healthy living through year-round awareness efforts, fundraising activities, and advocacy programs..

2K SPORTS CLASSIC benefiting COACHES vs. CANCER

OFFICIAL TOURNAMENT WEBSITE: The official website of the tournament is www.coachesvscancer.com. The site contains the latest news and information regarding the 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer.

PRESEASON ATTENTION - TEAM DIVISION: Both Arizona and Texas A&M are ranked in both preseason polls. Arizona is at No. 16 in both the ESPN/USA Today and Associated rankings while Texas A&M is ranked No. 19 by the coaches and No. 20 by the writers. Since 1986-87, Arizona has been ranked in every AP poll except two (1995-96, 2001-02) and every coaches' poll except one (2001-02). Texas A&M was last ranked in the preseason in 2007-08, No. 15 by the coaches and No. 16 by the writers.

PRESEASON ATTENTION - INDIVIDUAL DIVISION: Two players participating in the 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer are listed among the 50 players on the John R. Wooden Award preseason watch list. Mississippi State guard Dee Bost and Texas A&M forward Khris Middleton are honored.

HOME SWEET HOME: This year marks the 14th consecutive year that Madison Square Garden will serve as host of the Championship Rounds of the 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer. The first two years (1995, 1996) the event was held at what was then known as Convention Hall (now Boardwalk Hall) in Atlantic City, N.J. The 1997 tournament took place at Continental Airlines Arena (now IZOD Center) in East Rutherford, N.J. The event will continue at Madison Square Garden through at last the 2020-21 season.

WELCOME BACK: Three teams in this year's 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer field return from previous years. St. John's is appearing in its fourth Classic, tying Memphis, Syracuse, and Texas for the most appearances in tournament history. The Red Storm are 3-4 in the Classic, having previously played in 2000 (lost in final to Kansas), 2003 (lost to Marquette), and 2006 (lost in consolation to Texas). Arizona and Mississippi State are each making their second appearance. Arizona last played in 2001 and beat then No. 2 Maryland and No. 6 Florida to claim the title. Mississippi State was part of the 2004 field and beat Fairfield and Birmingham-Southern before dropping its Championship Round games against Syracuse and Saint Mary's.

PUNCH YOUR TICKET: Since the beginning of the Classic in 1995, all but one team that has won the Championship has gone on to the NCAA Tournament. In the previous 16 years, 12 champions have been crowned (there was a showcase format in 1995, 1996, 2002, and 2003). Of those 12 champions, one has won a National Championship (Florida, 2005), one has lost in the title game (Memphis, 2007), one has advanced to the Elite Eight (Temple, 1998), four have reached the Sweet 16 (Syracuse, 2009; Duke, 2008; Arizona, 2001; and Kansas, 2000), and three have reached the second round (Pittsburgh 2010; Maryland, 2006; Princeton, 1997). Syracuse, the 2004 champ, dropped its NCAA opener that March. Stanford, which won the 1999 event, is only tournament champion not to earn a postseason berth.

HELPFUL START: Seventy-two teams that have participated in the 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer have gone on to postseason play that year – 54 NCAA, 14 NIT, and four CBI. Seven teams have advanced to the Final Four after opening their seasons in the event. Three - Maryland (2002), Syracuse (2003), and Florida (2006) - went on to win the National Championship. Texas (2003), Marquette (2003), George Mason (2006), and Memphis (2008) are the others to reach the Final Four.

CATAPULTING INTO THE RANKINGS: The Classic has catapulted several teams into the national rankings based on their performance in the event, none so much as Arizona (2001) and Syracuse (2009). The Wildcats entered the 2001 event unranked, but wins over No. 2 Maryland (71-67) and No. 6 Florida (75-71) sent Arizona to No. 8 in the Associated Press poll immediately after the tournament. Syracuse experienced the same rush in 2009. The Orange, unranked in the AP poll and 25th in the ESPN/USA Today poll, won four games in the event, including a semifinal win over No. 12 California (95-73) and a win in the title game against No. 4 North Carolina (87-71). The next week, the Orange were ranked ninth by ESPN/USA Today and 10th by the AP.

THE MAN: Ohio State's Evan Turner posted a triple-double when he went for 14 points, 17 rebounds, and 10 assists in the Buckeyes' 100-60 win over Alcorn State on Nov. 9, 2009. Turner went on to break or tie five tournament records that year to earn all-tournament honors. However, Turner did not earn Most Valuable Player honors in 2009. The award went to Syracuse's Wes Johnson, who led the Orange to the Classic title.

SELECT COMPANY: In the last six NBA drafts, 15 players who have played in the 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer have been selected in the top 10. Most recently, Texas' Tristan Thompson was chosen fourth by Cleveland in the 2011 Draft. In 2010, Ohio State's Evan Turner (second overall, Philadelphia) and Wes Johnson of Syracuse (fourth overall, Minnesota) were chosen. In 2008 and 2009, the overall top pick was a tournament alum. In 2009 Blake Griffin of Oklahoma was selected by the Clippers and in 2008 Derrick Rose of Memphis went to the Bulls. A complete list of tournament NBA draftees can be found in this packet.

THE UNTOUCHABLES: Of the 109 teams that have participated in the event since 1995, only seven remain undefeated in Classic play. Pittsburgh (2003, 2010) is tops with a 5-0 record. Arizona (2001), Kansas (2000), Saint Joseph's (1996, 2003), and Stanford (1999) each own 2-0 records. La Salle (1995) and Penn State (1995) are 1-0 against Classic competition.

HOSTS WITH THE MOST: The hosts of the four Regional Round sites of the 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer combined for a 92-43 record and three NCAA Tournament bids last season. Arizona ended the season ranked No. 9 by ESPN/USA Today and No. 17 by the AP. St. John's was ranked No. 19 by the AP and Texas A&M was ranked No. 24, also by the AP.

FAQs ABOUT THE 2012 2K SPORTS CLASSIC

Q: *In light of the NABC's recent announcement, how are things changing?*

A: Only the beneficiary of this event is changing.

The 2K Sports Classic, which has been produced by the Gazelle Group since 1995 and has been played at Madison Square Garden since 1998, will remain at Madison Square Garden through at least the 2020-21 season. The 2K Sports Classic annually features several of the best men's college basketball teams in the nation and has produced many memorable games and champions. Gazelle has been responsible for the production of every element of this event since its inception, leading to its proud history and tradition, and will continue to produce this most highly anticipated early-season tournament at Madison Square Garden.

Q: *Who will become the beneficiary of this event in 2012?*

A: Beginning in 2012, Wounded Warrior Project will become the beneficiary. The mission of Wounded Warrior Project is to honor and empower wounded warriors. WWP seeks to raise awareness and to enlist the public's aid for the needs of injured service members, to help injured servicemen and women aid and assist each other, and to provide unique, direct programs and services to meet their needs.

Q: *What is the television situation for future 2K Sports Classics?*

A: The Gazelle Group and ESPN recently entered into a long-term contract for the 2K Sports Classic in which ESPN will distribute a minimum of six games per year.

Q: *Why are things changing?*

A: The NABC and American Cancer Society have decided to begin production of their own (and new) event to benefit the coaches vs. cancer program. It will be played at a different location and broadcast on a different network.

Q: *So, other than the beneficiary, everything here stays the same?*

A: Yes. Same venue, same dates, same television, same sponsors, same event producer.

ALL-AMERICANS: This past April, the Gazelle Group produced the inaugural All-American Championship featuring many of the best high school senior and junior boys basketball players in the nation. By all accounts the event was a success and the reason for that success can be found on the floor at Madison Square Garden. Five AAC alumni will participate in the Championship Rounds of the 2K Sports Classic - Rodney Hood of Mississippi State, Arizona's Josiah Turner, and Moe Harkless, D'Angelo Harrison, and Sir'Dominic Pointer of St. John's. Hood, Pointer, and Turner played for the South squad (93-91 OT victors vs. the North), while Harkless and Harrison squared off in an East-West showdown which Harrison's West team won, 107-104.

HONORABLE MENTION: Former Princeton head coach Pete Carril, former Mount St. Mary's head coach Jim Phelan, and former Virginia women's coach Debbie Ryan have been chosen the 2011 recipients of the Joe Lapchick Character Award, annually given to coaches who have exhibited the character traits of the former St. John's legend. The awards ceremony will be held at Madison Square Garden during the semifinals of the 2K Sports Classic benefiting Coaches vs. Cancer on Nov. 17.

THE FIELD

St. John's Red Storm

Head Coach: Steve Lavin
Big East Conference



Have been to the NCAA Tournament 27 times, including this past season when the Red Storm posted a 21-12 record and tied for third in the Big East Conference...that record was augmented by a 7-1 record at Madison Square Garden, six wins against Top 25 teams, and four wins against Top 10 teams...the Red Storm also experienced a 38.1 percent increase in home attendance in 2010-11 – the fourth-highest increase in the nation...under the direction of second-year head coach Steve Lavin, St. John's welcomes a recruiting class that ranks among the top three nationally...making its fourth 2K Sports Classic appearance and first since 2006.

Arizona Wildcats (#16/#16)

Head Coach: Sean Miller
Pac-12 Conference



Have been to the NCAA Tournament 26 of the last 27 years...the Wildcats have recorded 24 20-win seasons since 1984 and have won 678 games in that span...in just his second season, head coach Sean Miller, the 2010-11 Pac-10 Coach of the Year, guided Arizona to a 30-8 record and the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament...the Wildcats return 10 players and three starters from last year's squad, including senior guard Kyle Fogg (8.1 ppg, 99 assists) and junior forward Solomon Hill (8.0 ppg)...Miller and his staff also bring in a Top 10 recruiting class in 2011-12...played in the 2001 Classic.

Texas A&M Aggies (#20/#19)

Head Coach: Billy Kennedy
Big 12 Conference



New head coach Billy Kennedy inherits a team that went 24-9 en route to their sixth straight NCAA Tournament this past season... A HISTORY IN BRIEF

1995 – The inaugural event, known as the Atlantic City Shootout, is a doubleheader at the Atlantic City Convention Center (now Boardwalk Hall). Penn State's Pete Lisicky scores 35 points to lead the Nittany Lions to an 88-61 win over Penn. With 17 seconds left in the day's second game, Olof Landgren hits a layup to give La Salle a 68-66 upset victory over Marquette.

1996 – It's a good day for Philadelphia as Temple and Saint Joseph's earn wins in the doubleheader in Atlantic City. The Hawks would go on to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Coaches vs. Cancer program becomes the beneficiary of the event.

1997 – The first "tournament" in event history is held and it's Princeton which emerges victorious. After beating No. 22 Texas, the Tigers down N.C. State at the Meadowlands for the title. Princeton would eventually be ranked as high as seventh this season.

1998 – The Classic moves to its permanent home, Madison Square Garden. Seventh-ranked Temple overcomes a 16-point deficit to beat Wake Forest in the championship game.

1999 – 1998-99 national finalists UConn and Duke join Stanford and Iowa to form the strongest field to date. However, it's the Cardinal, behind twins Jason and Jarron Collins and their combined 35 points and 22 rebounds, who win the title with a 72-58 win over Iowa. UConn beat Duke in the consolation game, sending the Blue Devils to 0-2 for the first time in more than 40 years.

2000 – No. 7 Kansas beats hometown favorite St. John's to win the championship. St. John's advanced with a 62-61 win over No. 12 Kentucky which saw the Red Storm come back from four down with 22 seconds left. Kansas, Kentucky, and UCLA would each advance to the 2001 NCAA Sweet 16.

2001 – Unranked Arizona beats No. 2 Maryland and No. 6 Florida to earn the title.

2002 – The previous three events each featured three teams that would go on to the 2003 Final Four. Eventual national champion Syracuse loses to Memphis on the first day while Marquette and Texas win their game on the event's second day. Future stars Carmelo Anthony, Dwyane Wade, T.J. Ford, and Mo Williams are named to the all-tournament team.

2003 – As in 2002, the event features two doubleheaders rather than a tournament format. The 2003 Classic witnesses the emergence of Jameer Nelson, who had 20 points, eight rebounds, and 10 assists in a 73-66 win over No. 10 Gonzaga. Nelson would go on to lead Saint Joseph's to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament and garner national Player of the Year honors.

2004 – A new expanded format featuring 16 teams and four regional sites debuts. Saint Mary's upsets California to crash a Top 25 party at MSG, but it's No. 6 Syracuse which comes away with the title after beating No. 24 Memphis, 77-62.

2005 – Eventual national champion Florida tips off its title run with wins over No. 18 Wake Forest and No. 16 Syracuse at The Garden.

2006 – Although his team did not win the title, Texas freshman Kevin Durant proves why he is the nation's top player by scoring 91 points and hauling down 38 rebounds in the first four games of his collegiate career.

2007 – The biggest upset in Classic history occurs in Lexington as Gardner-Webb downs No. 22 Kentucky, 84-68. No. 3 Memphis would go on to win the title with wins over Oklahoma and Connecticut.

2008 – No. 5 Duke makes it look easy with Championship Round wins over Southern Illinois (83-58) and Michigan (71-56).

2009 – For the first time in the history of the event, four nationally-ranked teams participate in the Championship Rounds at Madison Square Garden. In the ESPN/USA Today preseason coaches' poll, North Carolina is ranked fourth, California is 12th, Ohio State is 17th, and Syracuse is 25th. When it was all over, Wes Johnson became a NBA lottery pick in leading Syracuse to its second Classic title.

2010 – Pittsburgh, ranked fourth nationally, squeaks by No. 22 Texas, 68-66, to win its first ever title. Ashton Gibbs is named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Today, more than 2,000 Division I, II, and III college coaches are involved in the program. Coaches vs. Cancer has raised nearly \$50 million since its inception to support the American Cancer Society's lifesaving mission to eliminate cancer as a life-threatening disease. Additionally, more than 100 high school coaches also participate in the program.

In 1998, the Coaches vs. Cancer Council was formed - a distinguished group of NABC member basketball coaches, American Cancer Society volunteers, and business leaders from across the country - to explore new and innovative ways to raise funds, recruit prominent coaches, enhance the program, and help win the fight against cancer.

Because cancer has touched so many of our nation's basketball coaches, Coaches vs. Cancer offers them the unique opportunity to fight the disease.
